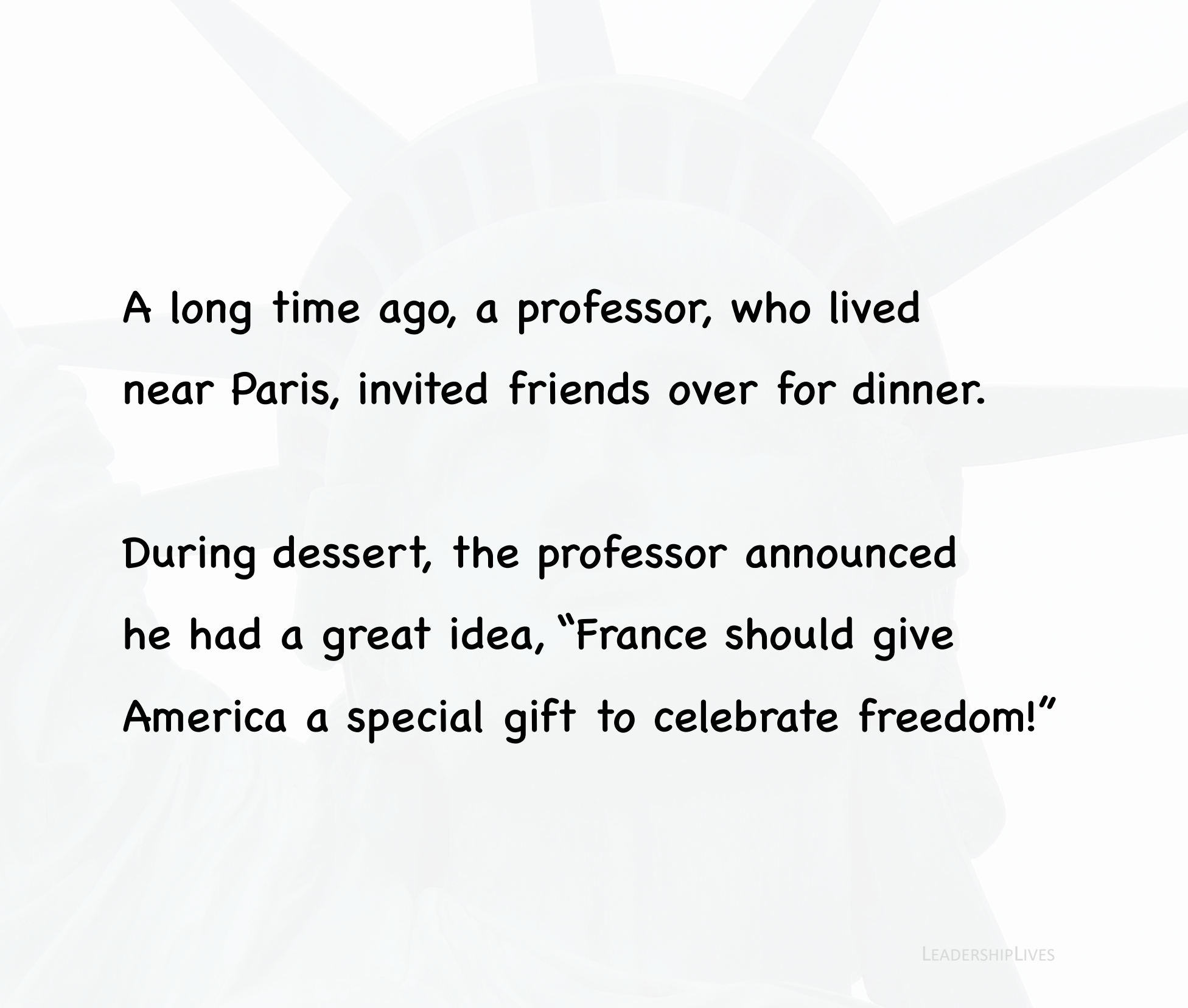
A Gift of Friendship

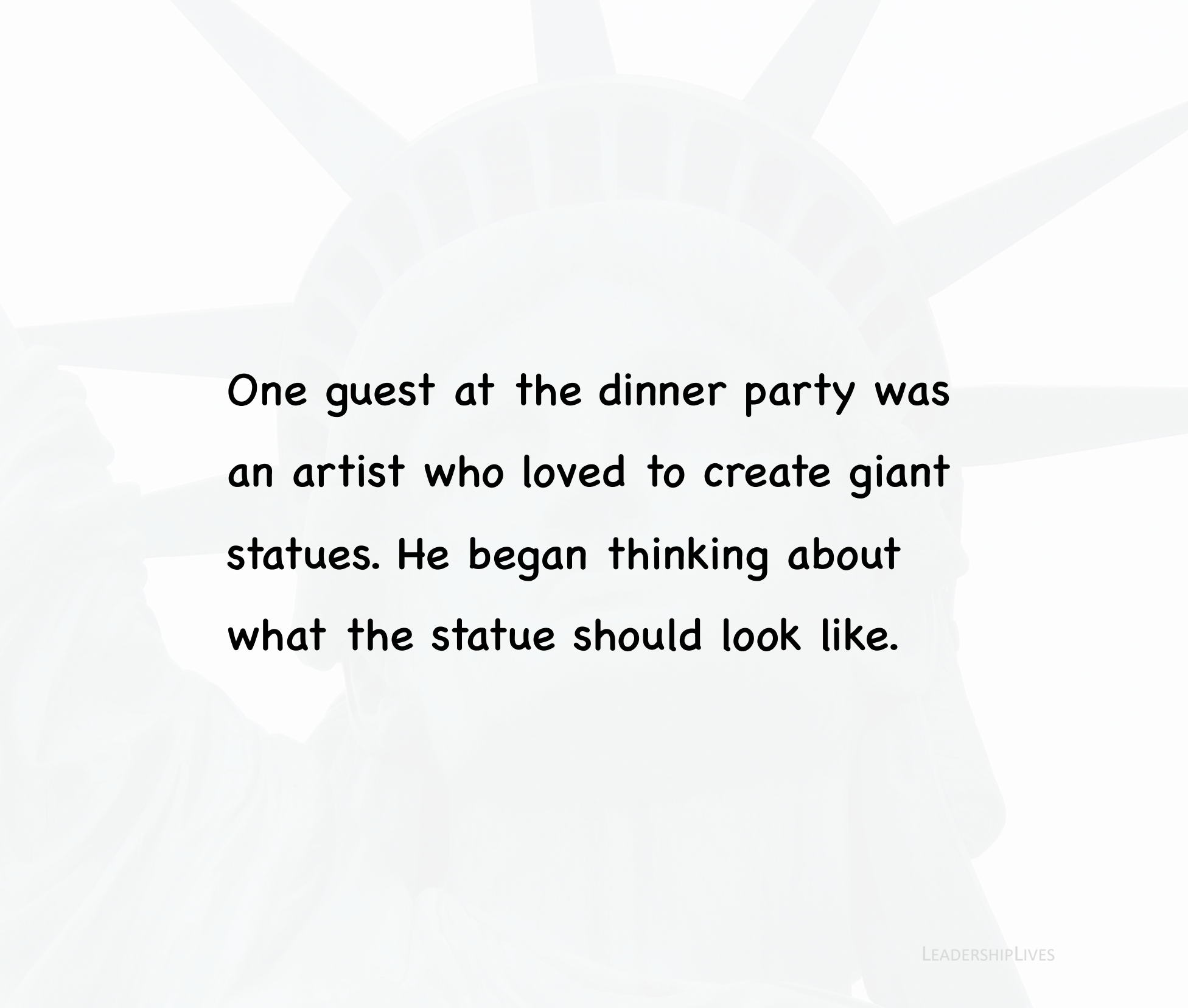




A long time ago, a professor, who lived near Paris, invited friends over for dinner.

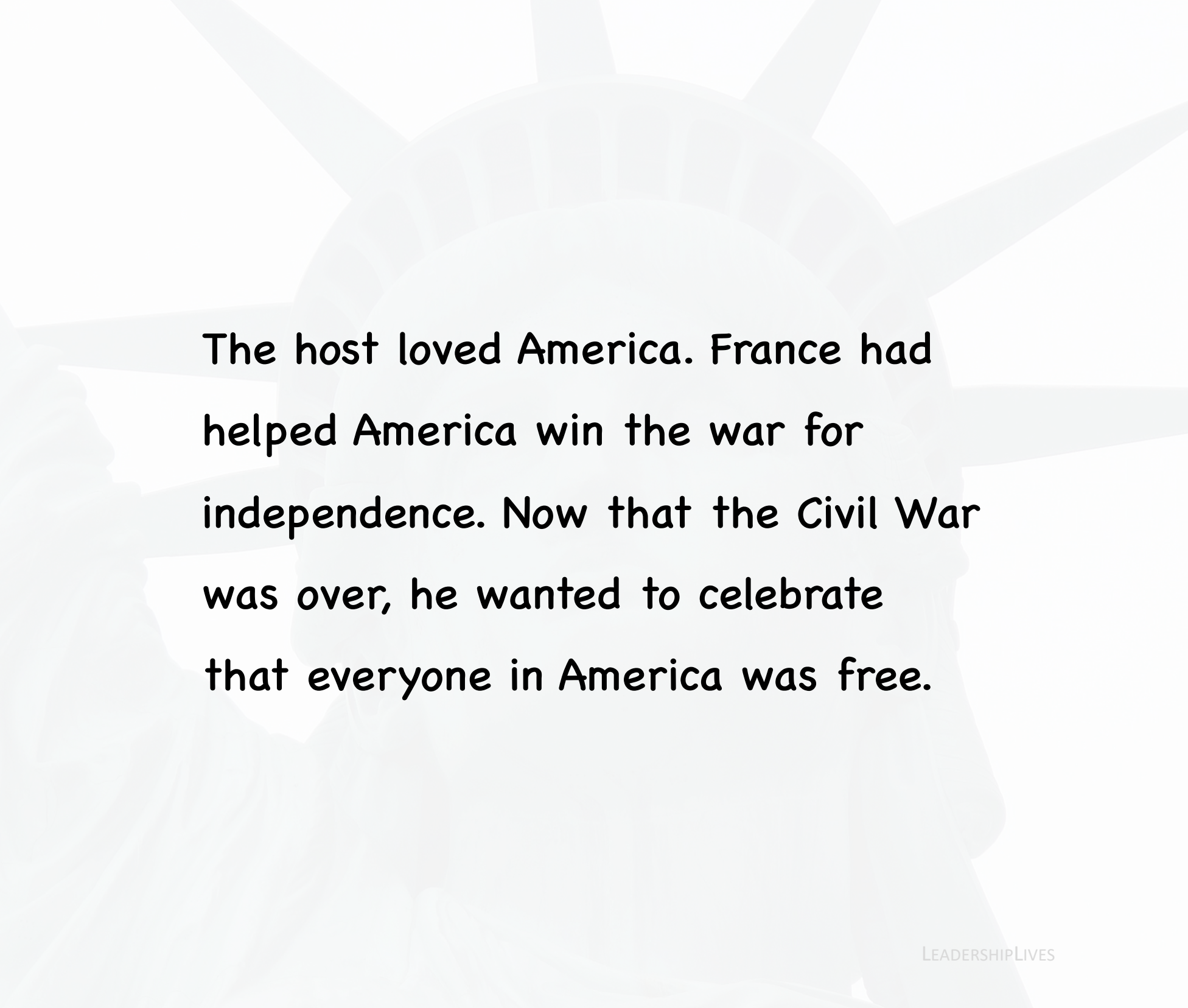
During dessert, the professor announced he had a great idea, "France should give America a special gift to celebrate freedom!"





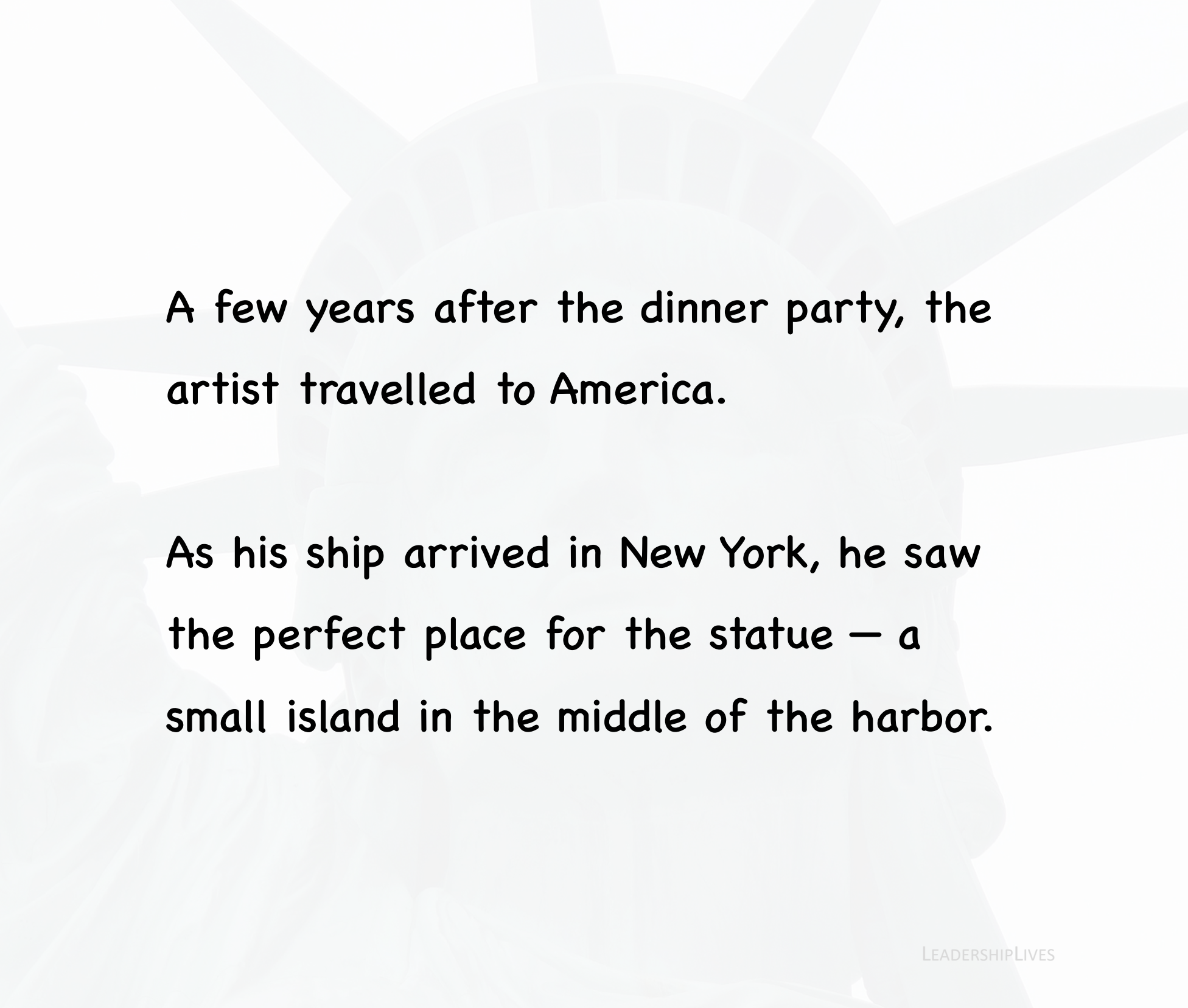
One guest at the dinner party was an artist who loved to create giant statues. He began thinking about what the statue should look like.





The host loved America. France had helped America win the war for independence. Now that the Civil War was over, he wanted to celebrate that everyone in America was free.

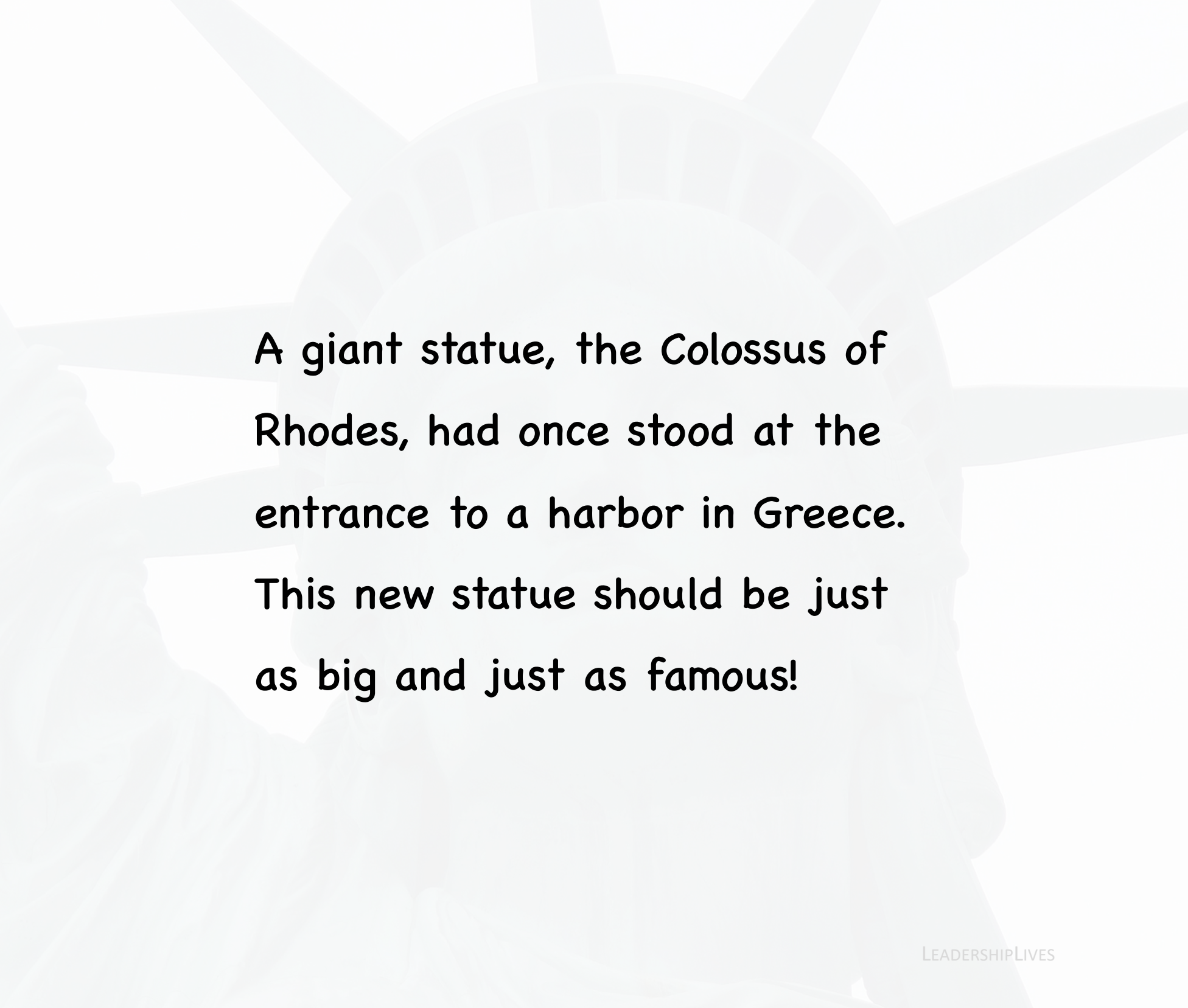

A few years after the dinner party, the artist travelled to America.

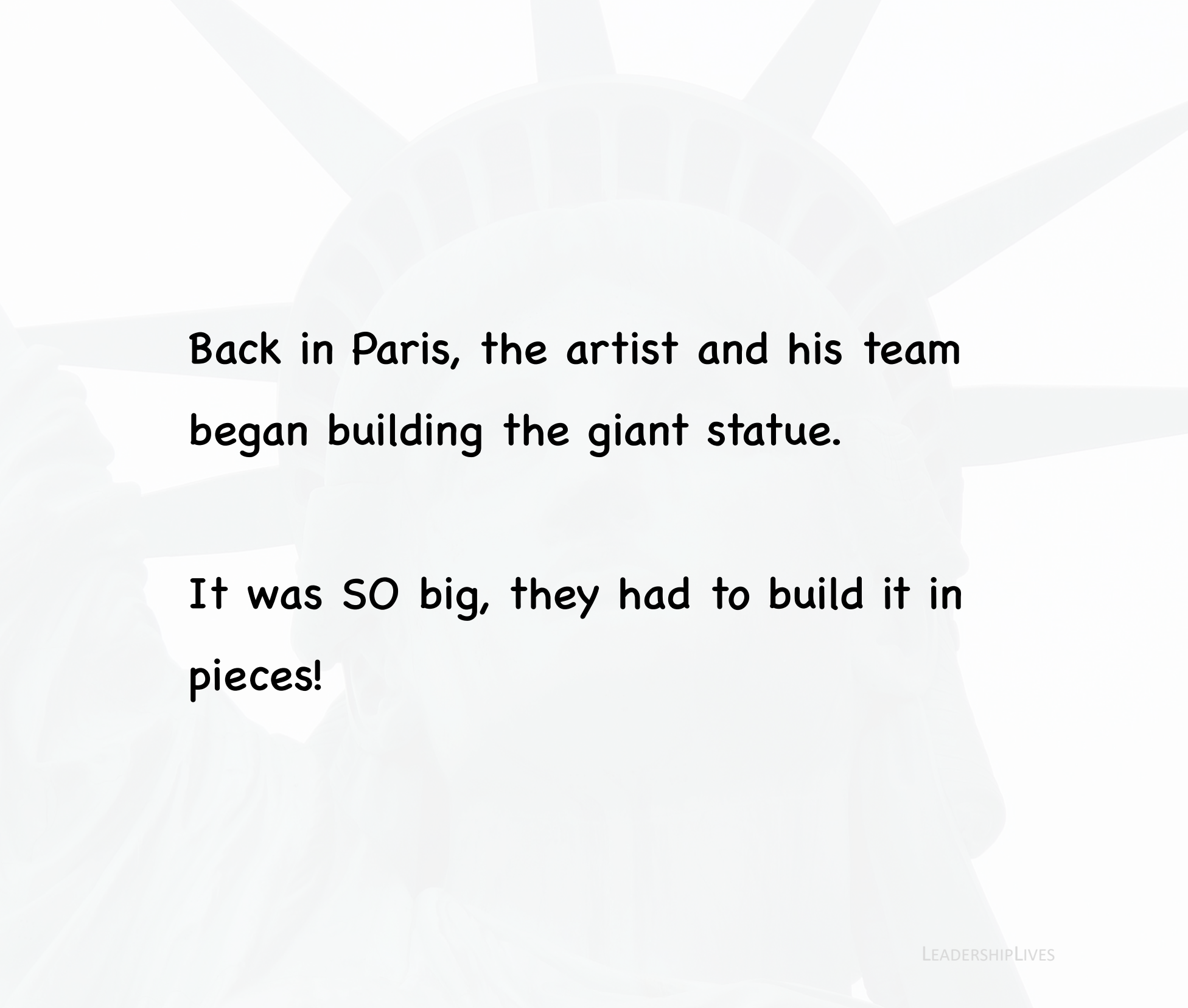
As his ship arrived in New York, he saw the perfect place for the statue — a small island in the middle of the harbor.

began building the giant statue.

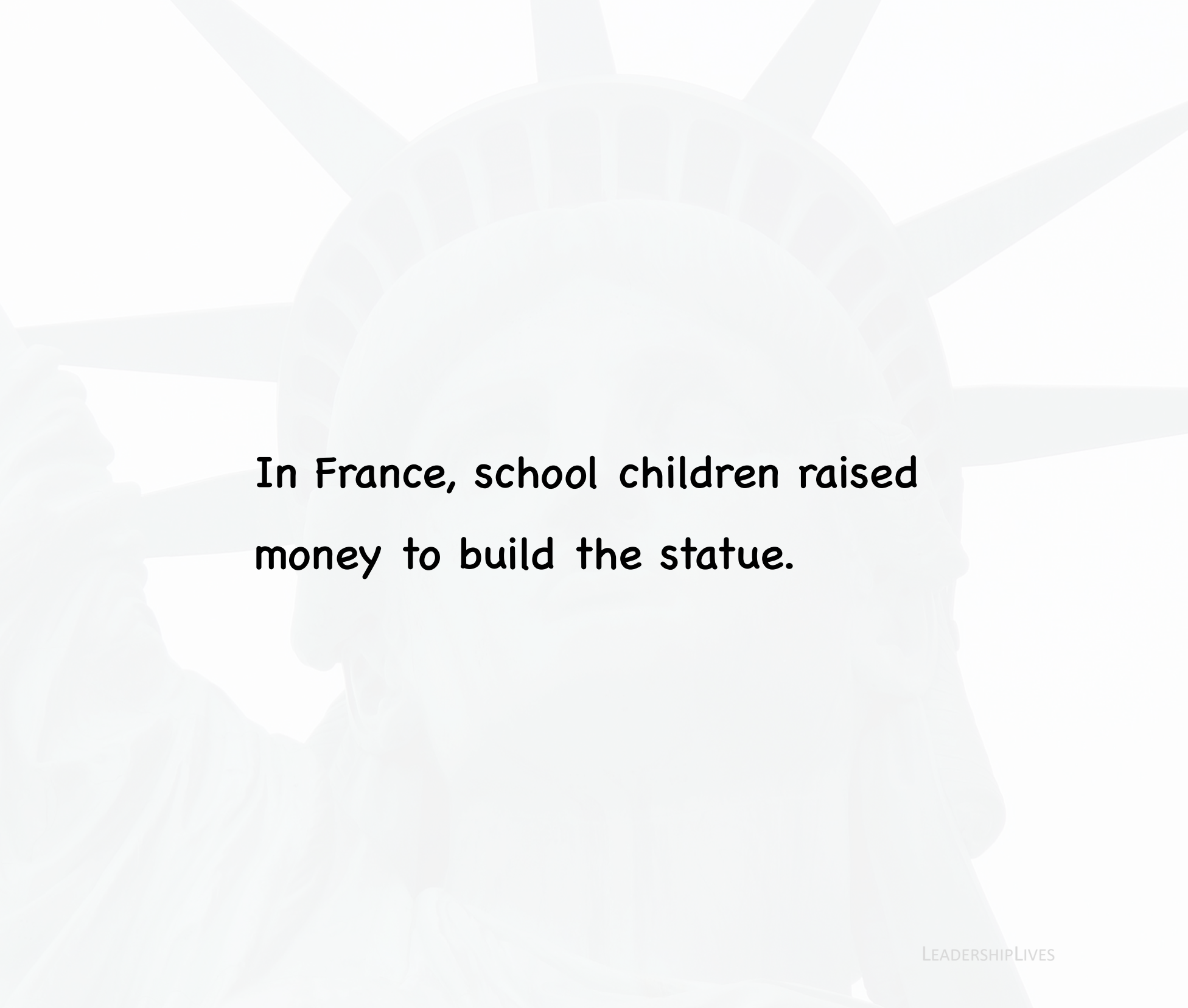
It was SO big, they had to build it in

to celebrate America's 100th birthday.**

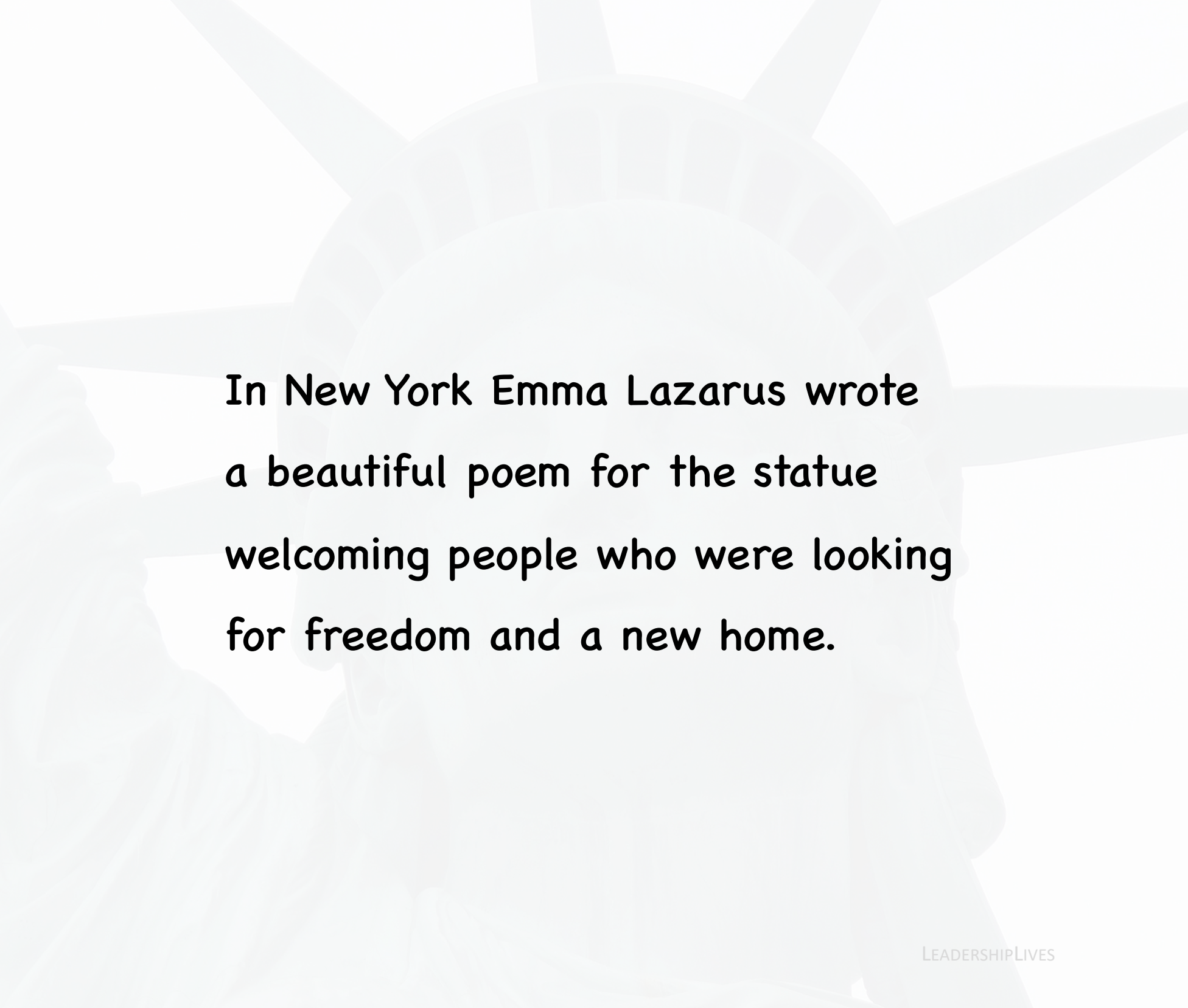




**In France, school children raised
money to build the statue.**

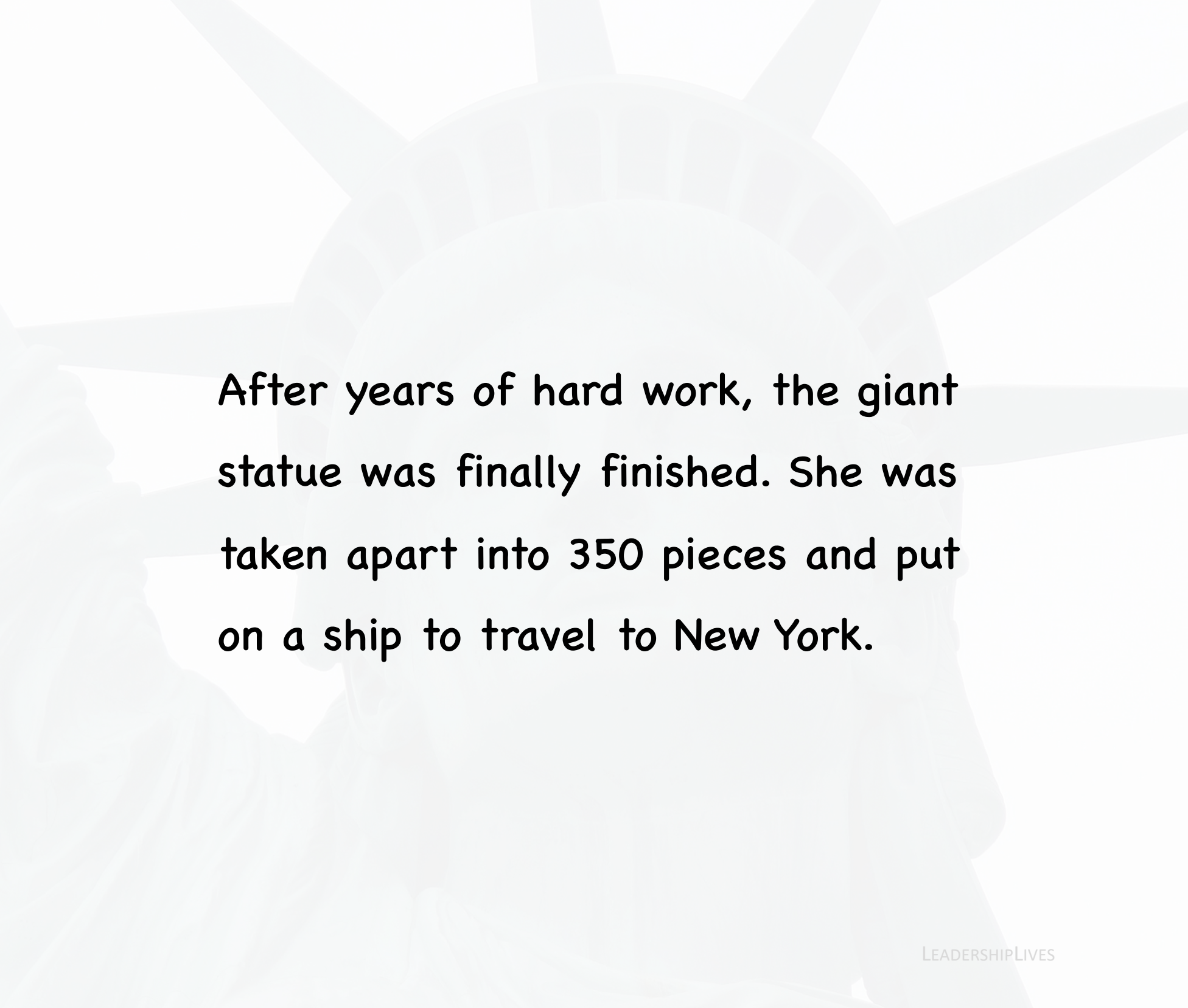

for freedom and a new home.





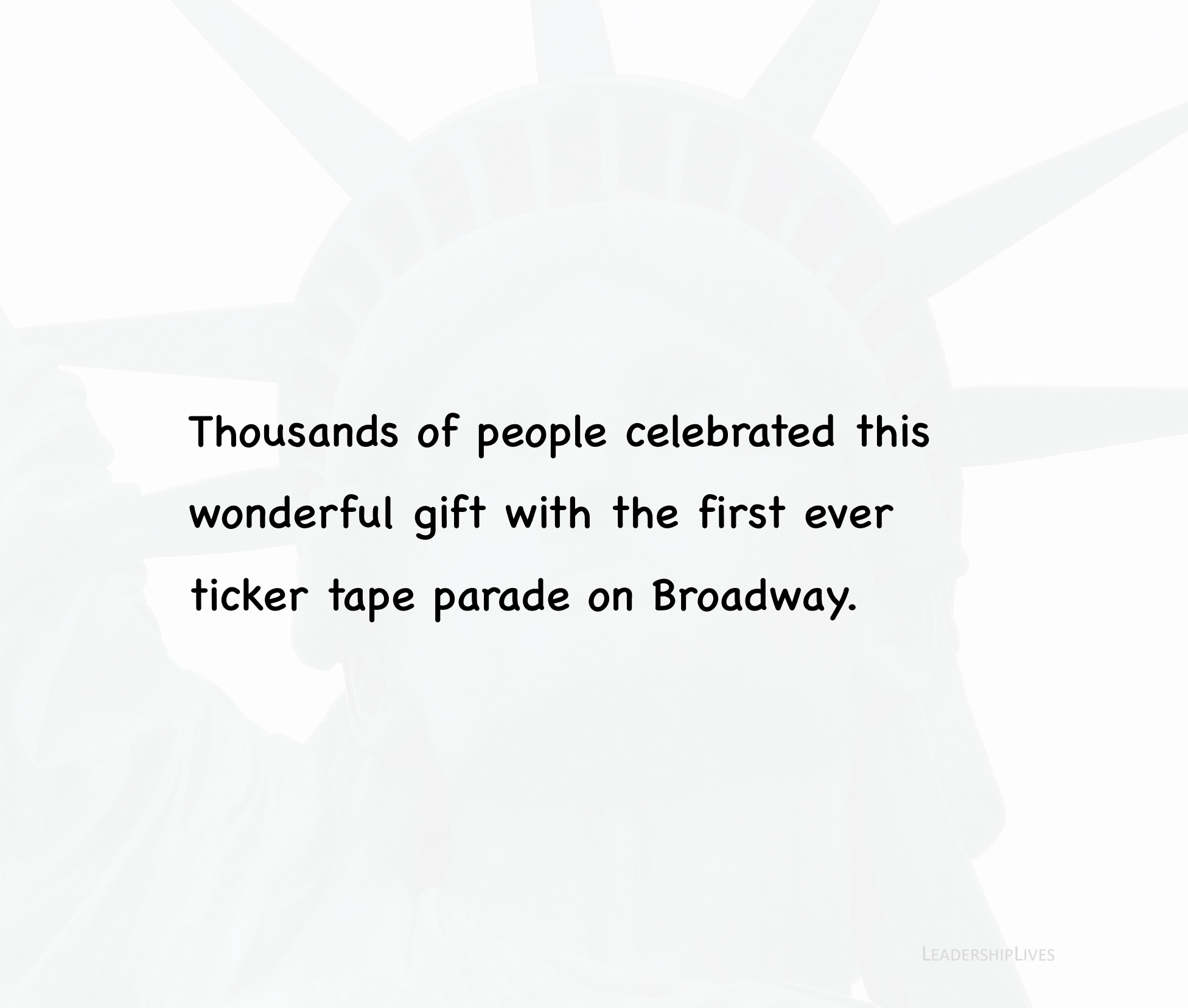
After years of hard work, the giant statue was finally finished. She was taken apart into 350 pieces and put on a ship to travel to New York.





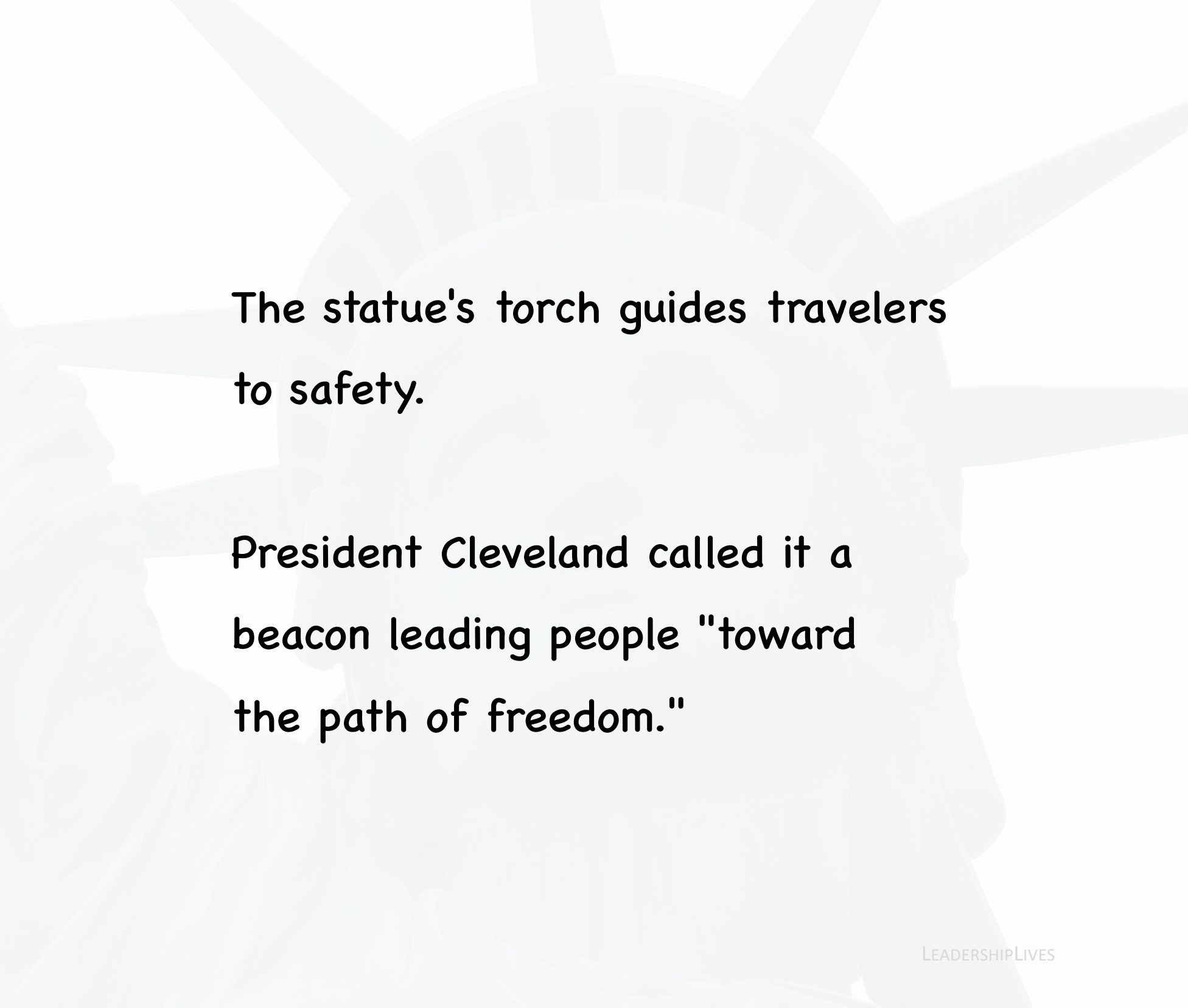
**Workers in New York put the statue

Thousands of people celebrated this wonderful gift with the first ever ticker tape parade on Broadway.

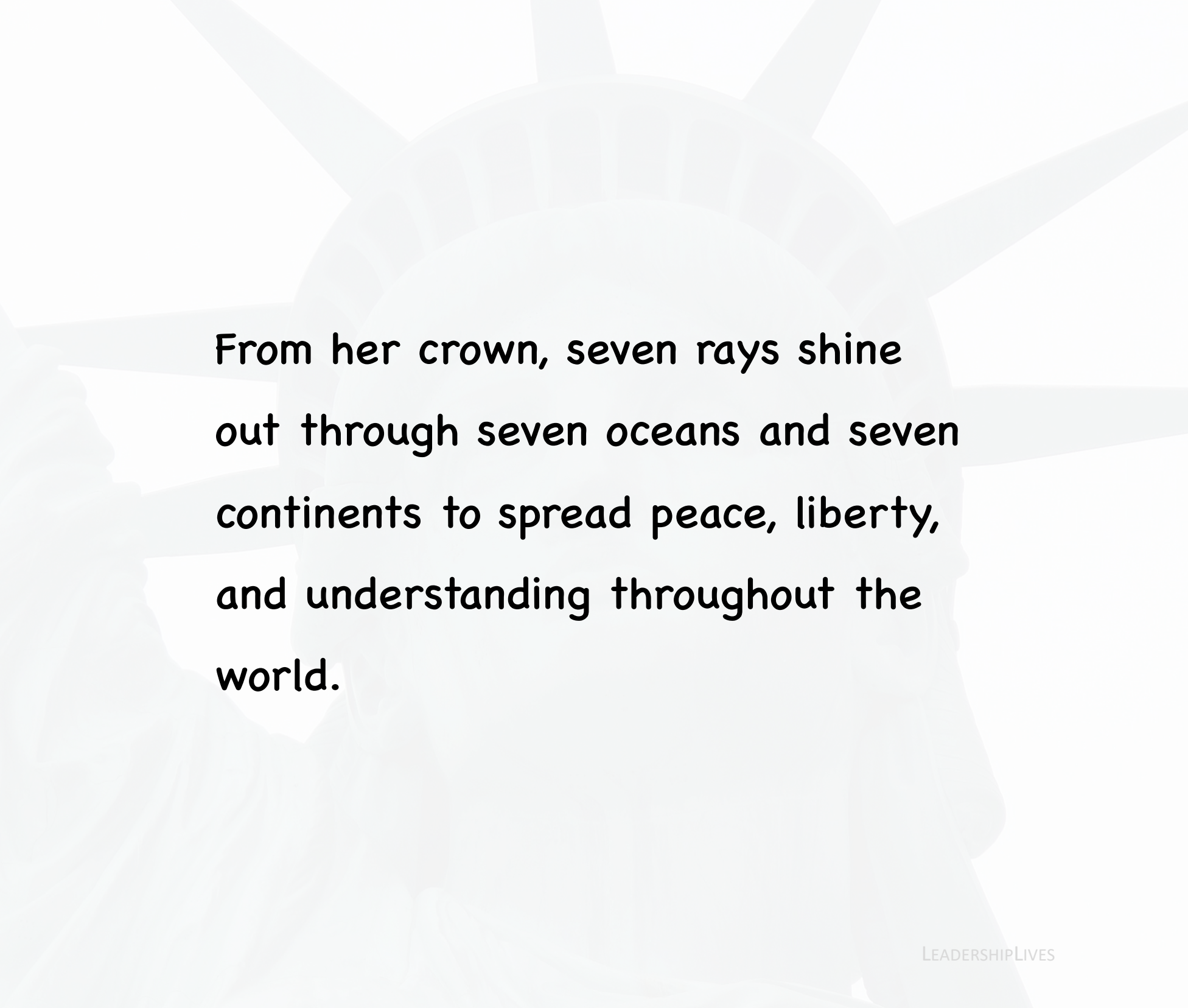




The statue's torch guides travelers
to safety.

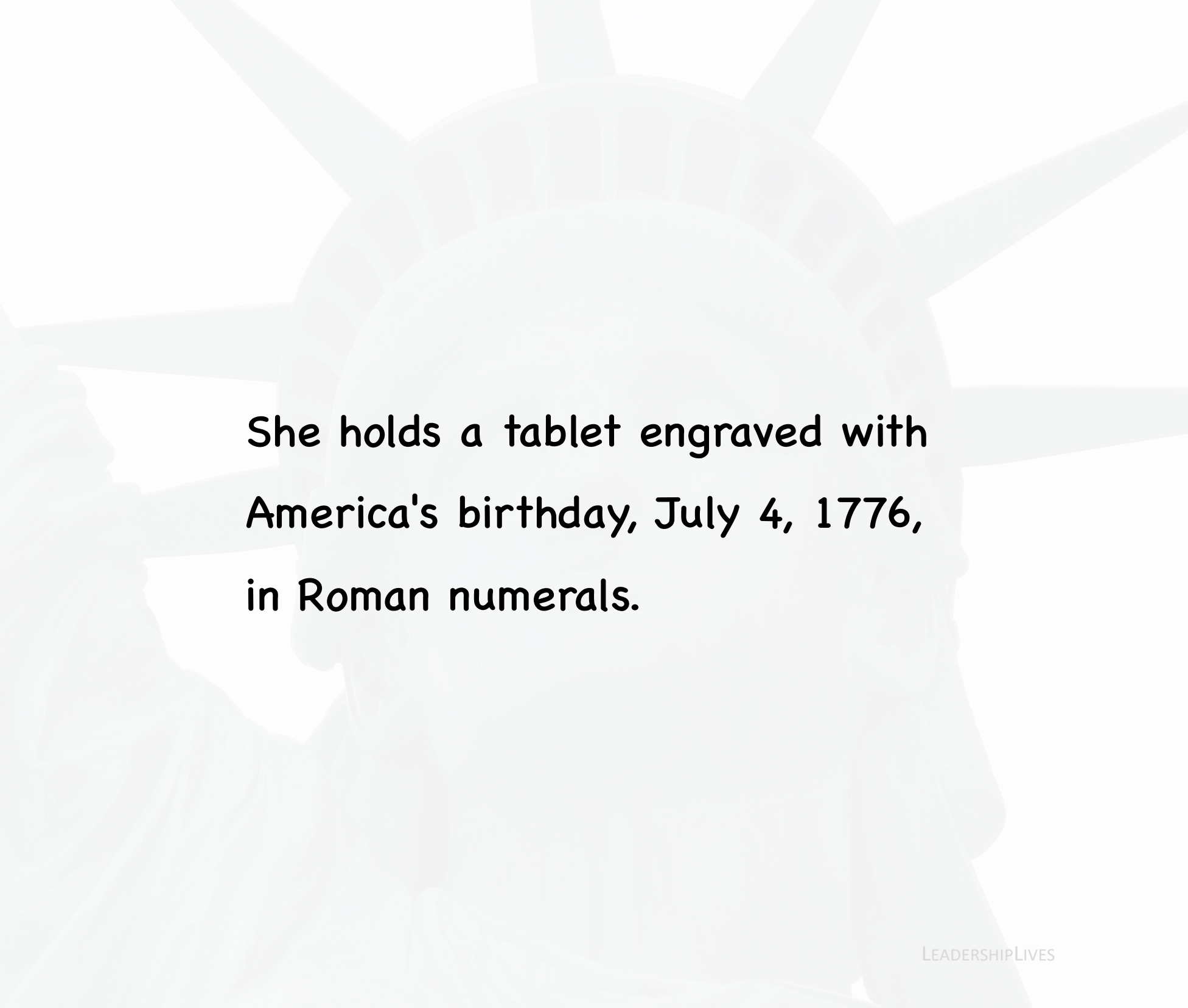
President Cleveland called it a

world.

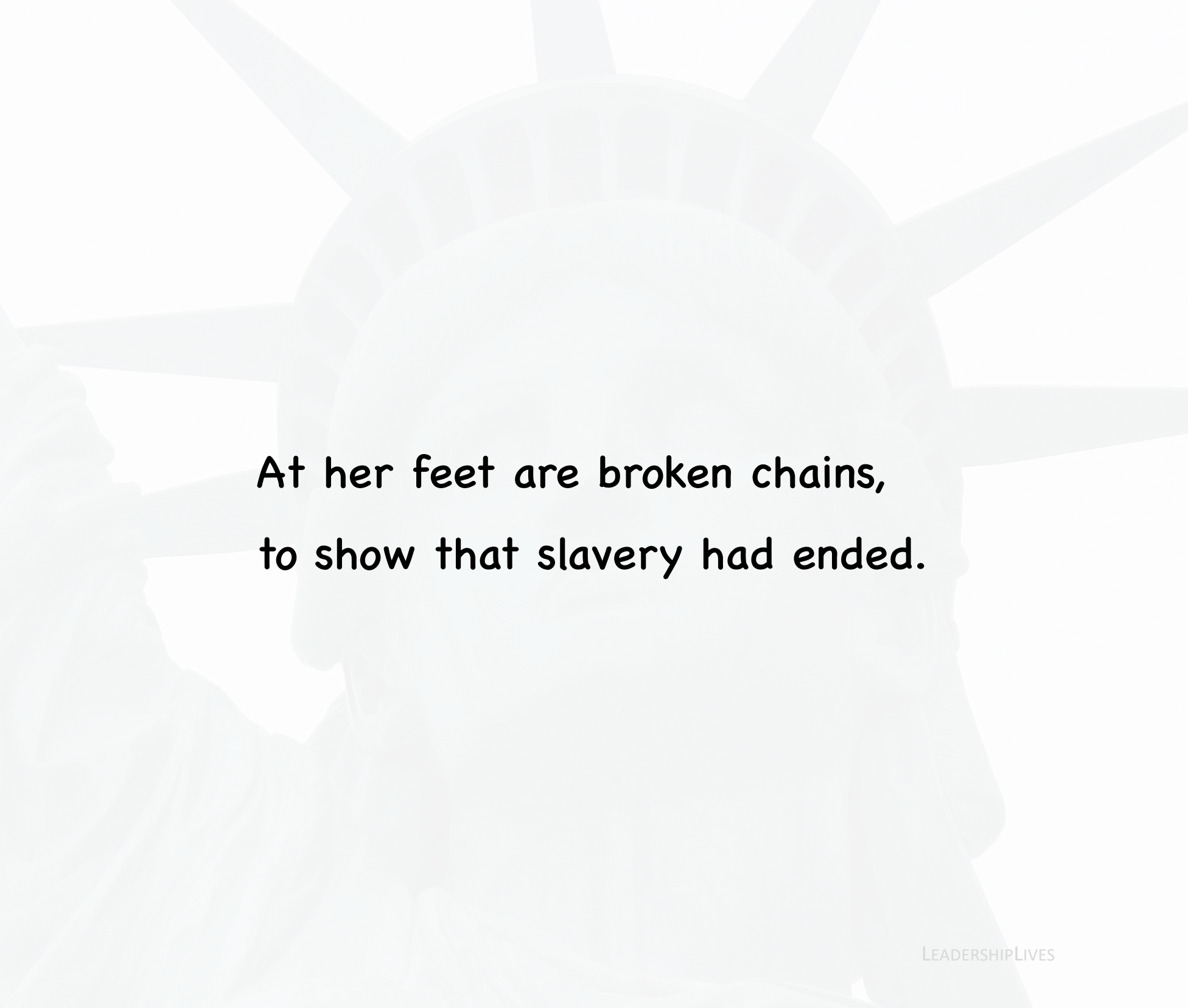




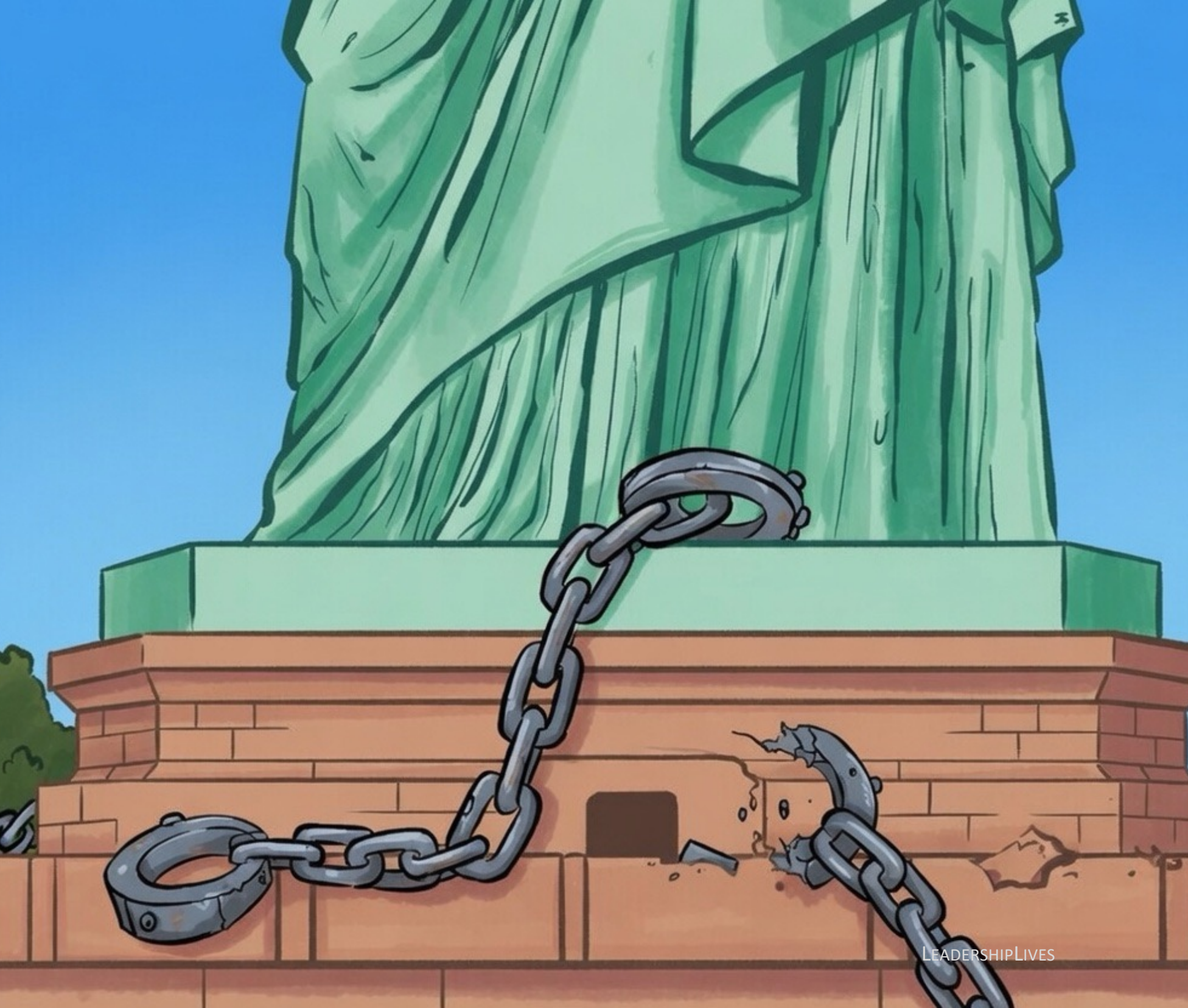

to show that slavery had ended.



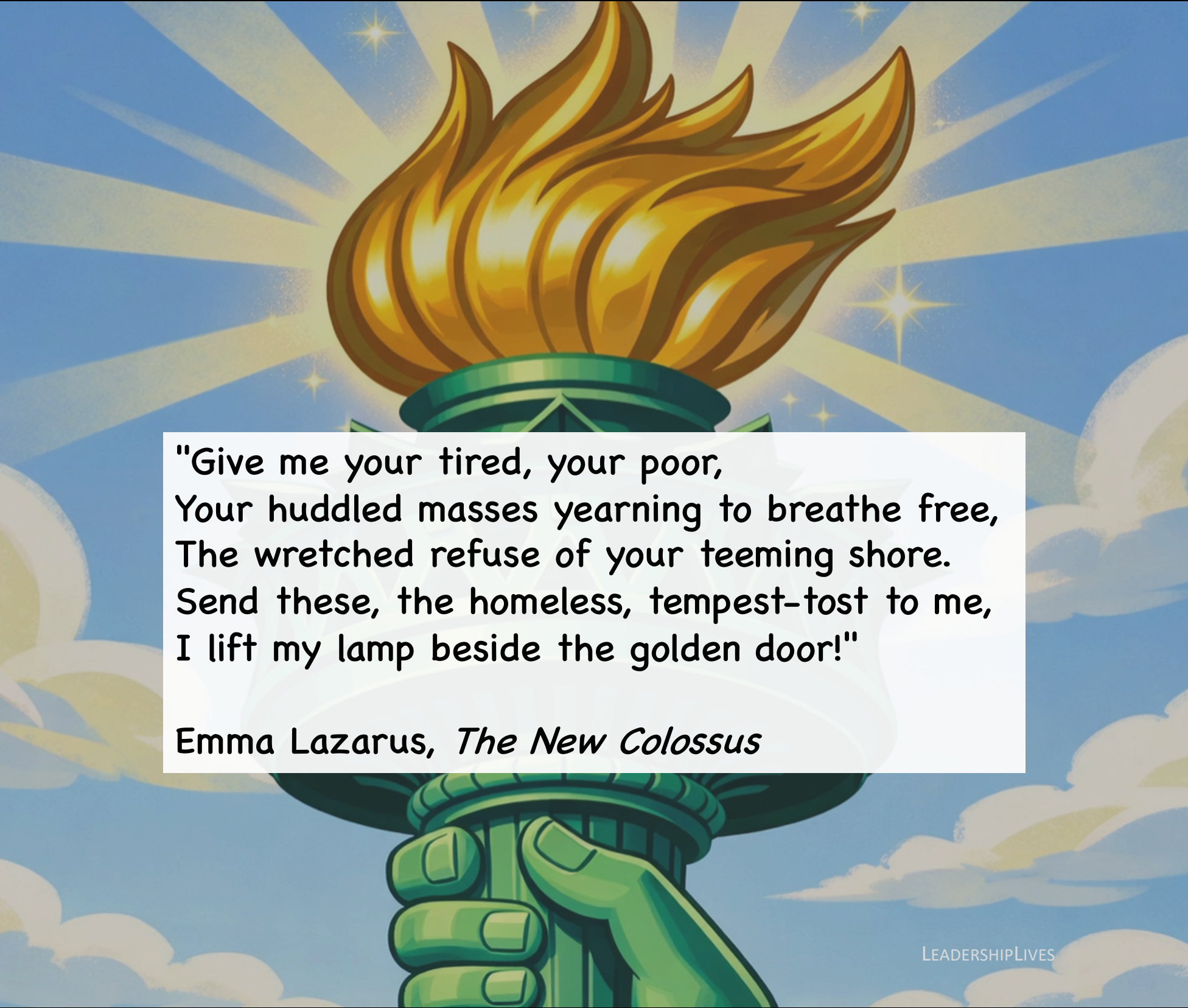
