

Lessons from Paul the Apostle's First Journey

Paul's first journey teaches that God uses ordinary people who are willing to be sent, to confront darkness, to endure hardship, and to keep the gospel of pure grace clear - so that the door of faith can swing open to the whole world.

1. **Mentorship multiplies impact**

Barnabas sought out Saul in Tarsus, brought him to Antioch, and later shared the leadership of the first missionary team. Because one encourager believed in him, the greatest missionary in history was launched. Investing in others often unlocks destinies far greater than our own.

2. **Start where you have relational strength**

The team wisely began in Cyprus, Barnabas's homeland and a place with existing believers. Strategic starting points built on existing connections increase the chance of early momentum and lasting fruit.

3. **Go first to the natural gathering places**

Paul established a consistent pattern of preaching in synagogues and

traveling along major ports and Roman roads—hubs where people already gathered and news traveled fast. Effective witness prioritizes high-traffic, high-influence locations.

4. Confront opposition with Holy-Spirit boldness

When the sorcerer Elymas tried to turn the Roman governor away from the faith, Paul, filled with the Spirit, openly rebuked him. The resulting blindness led to Sergius Paulus's conversion—the first recorded high-ranking Gentile believer. Spiritual authority confronts deception rather than avoiding it.

5. Expect both acceptance and rejection—and pivot accordingly

In Antioch of Pisidia, Iconium, and elsewhere, large crowds responded while others grew jealous and hostile. Paul and Barnabas declared they would turn to the Gentiles. Faithfulness means continuing the mission even when the original audience turns away.

6. Miracles open doors, but character sustains the work

The healing of the lifelong cripple in Lystra caused the crowd to hail Paul and Barnabas as gods. Their horrified refusal to accept worship demonstrated humility and redirected glory to the living God. Power without character can derail the mission; character keeps it pure.

7. Resilience turns setbacks into testimonies

After being stoned and left for dead outside Lystra, Paul got up, walked back into the city, and continued the journey the next day. The one who

once approved Stephen's stoning now became the stoned—and refused to quit. Perseverance under persecution authenticates the message.

8. Strengthen what has been planted

After reaching Derbe, Paul and Barnabas deliberately retraced their steps to strengthen the new believers in Lystra, Iconium, and Antioch of Pisidia.

Planting is only the beginning; intentional follow-up builds lasting churches.

9. Defend the pure gospel of grace

Upon returning, the team faced pressure to add Mosaic law requirements for Gentile believers. This conflict led to the Jerusalem Council and later to Paul's letter to the Galatians, insisting that justification comes by faith in Christ alone. Guarding the heart of the gospel is non-negotiable.
